Working with tools policy written in line with setting risk assessment

Learning to safely use appropriate tools is an important part of a child's development. They enable a child to fashion instruments for both practical usefulness and pleasure. Tools help children learn how natural materials feel and change and when used safely, help to develop coordination, dexterity and ingenuity.

Only Level 3 Qualified Forest School Leaders or practitioners who have experience and competence using tools, will train children to use tools and will be responsible for the care and safety of all individuals when using tools, including implementing the safe tool use policy and procedure.

At The Little Firefly Forest School and Outdoor Nursery, we will encourage the use of the following tools:

- Hand drill;
- Palm drill;
- Small hacksaws;
- Bowsaws;
- Loppers;
- Bill hooks;
- Hammers/ mallets.

Risks BEFORE control measure put in place

Control Measures

- Level 3 Forest School Leader/competent person to deliver activity.
- Tool area to be clearly defined.(blood bubble)
- Tool talk to be carried out before activity.
- Tool activity sheet to be signed off by manager on site.
- Gloves are to be worn on the helping hand where appropriate .
- Guards and covers to be replaced immediately after use.
- All children to be supervised when using tools.
- Tools to be checked regularly to ensure they are in good working order.
- When not in use tools must be stored in a locked container, out of reach of children.

Risks AFTER control measure put in place

<u>Maintenance</u>

Tools to be checked, cleaned, sharpened and oiled regularly, where necessary.
